There are poems about moon jelly fish, a frog and a fruit bat; about a heron and hiding in the supermarket. There's an embarrassing dads' competition, a girl who doesn't speak, and a Wildman who reappears in Suffolk after 8 centuries of silence. There are poems about love, loss and friendship, and poems about throwing woks and wagging tails; with illustrations from the fabulously talented Paul Bommer.

CHRISSIE GITTINS was born in Lancashire and lives in South London. Her children's poems have been broadcast on BBC R4, animated for Cheebies television and widely anthologized. Now You See Me, Now You ... was shortlisted for the first CLPE Poetry Award in 2003. Her second children's poetry collection I Don't Want an Avocado for an Uncle was shortlisted for the CLPE Poetry Award 2007 and was a Poetry Book Society Choice for the Children's Poetry Bookshelf. In 2010 the republished Now You See Me, Now You ... was a PBS Choice for the Children's Poetry Bookshelf for the Spring Term. Two of Chrissie's children's poems won Belmont Poetry Prizes in 2002. She has read her children's poetry at the Aldeburgh Poetry Festival, the Edinburgh International Book Festival, the Hay Festival and the Poets House in New York.
